## TRAVEL 40 MILES DOWN WOLF RIVER CITs BRAVE TRIP

LED BY STAFF COUNSELORS SAM DEFIGLIA AND IRA LURVEY, NINE CITs (COUNSELORS-IN-TRAINING) PADDED 40 MILES DOWN THE WOLF RIVER.

Traveling in four canoes, the boys carried three days' supply of food besides bed-rolls, tent facilities, and camping implements.

THE VOYAGE, INTENDED AS A TEST TRIP TO SEE IF THE RIVER COULD BE USED AS THE SITE OF FUTURE TRIPS FOR YOUNGER BOYS, BEGAN AT SHIOCTON, WISCONSIN, ABOUT 30 MILES FROM WAUPACA, AND CAME TO AN END AT NEW LONDON, WISCONSIN.

The original plans were to continue to Fremont, Wisconsin, a distance of about 15-20 miles more, but rain forced the campers to halt at New London.

DISPLAYING THEIR CAMPING SKILL TO FULL ABILITY, THE CANOEISTS CAMPED THE FIRST NIGHT IN WHAT APPEARED TO BE A COMBINATION OF COW PASTURE, FOREST, AND VALLEY.

Daybreak found the boys paddling down the Wolf. A two hour stop for "brunch" was the lone break in the 40 mile trip to New London.

## Lake Superior jaunt planned for July 27-29

CAMP WAUPACA'S famed "early bird" Lake Superior fishing trip has been scheduled for July 27 to 29. Joe and Skipper announced today.

THE TRIP, intended for the first boys signing up for camp last year, begins at Bayfield, Wisconsin, which is near the Canadian border. From Bayfield the boys board a fishing boat which travels to islands a short distance from the mainland.

PLANS CALL for the boys to also "camp out" one night on the trip, so as to combine camping experience with the fishing voyage.

ALTHOUGH ONLY two fish got "captured" last year, and there are rumors that they had "A&P Produce" stamped on them, the boys claim that the weather was against them and given good weather they will do much better this year.

WITH THE majority of the staff remaining at camp, activities will go on as usual for those boys not going on the trip.

## CLASSES TO CHANGE FOR NEXT PERIOD

The program staff of Camp Waupaca has just completed the new schedule of elective classes for July 20 to August 8.

Elective classes are held each morning, Monday through Saturday from 10-11 a.m. for cabins 3-9, and from 11-12 for cabins 1-2.

Campers choose 2 classes for each period. One for each Tues-Thurs-Sat and another for Mon-Weds-Fri.

Classes are fixed at a definite number so that individual attention can be given each camper-student.

This period such classes as dramatics, canoeing, riflery, tennis, league baseball, archery, B.B. gun, handicraft, and campcraft are being offered.

Attendance is taken at all classes, and red attendance feathers are presented at council campfires.
