SUNDAY (July 11)-FOR THE FIRST TIME IN CAMP WAUPACA'S HISTORY, A CAMPER TURNED IN A PERFECT TRACK MEET SCORE FOR THE SECOND WEEK IN A ROW TODAY, AS CABIN SIX'S TED PASTERNACK ACCOMPLISHED THIS REMARKABLE FEAT.
