



# RANGERS WIN 'FROGMEET'

## Triumph on Points, 7-2; Score Ties, Though, 50-50

SUNDAY (July 18)--For the first time in the history of Camp Waupaca, a Sunday

athletic meet ended in a tie today, when the Rangers and Commandos battled to a 50-50 standstill in Camp's first water-meet of the season.

However the Rangers managed to salvage a win on team points, edging the Commandos 7-2.

When it was learned that the two squads had fought each other to a standstill in total points, it was decided to score the "frogmeet" in a different manner. Each of the four cabin groups in the meet was divided into Ranger and Commando squads. It was then found that while in cabins 1-2 and 7-8 the Commandos won the greatest total of points, in cabins 3-4 and 5-6 the Rangers were victorious. The Rangers also triumphed 12-8 in the CIT division, giving them three team points to the Commandos two.

The usual four points were then awarded for a team victory, giving the Rangers a grand total of seven, against the Commandos' two.

Two events comprised the swim-meet. They were the crawl race and the underwater swim for distance.

Swim-meets are occasionally held in place of the usual Sunday track meet during an unusually warm Sunday, such as was experienced today. A general swim then follows.

The tie during the swim meet gives further evidence that the Rangers and Commandos are now as nearly equal in strength as it is possible for them to get.

If the ball merely hits the backboard, but bounces back instead of going through the hoop, it's but 1 point. Frank Krasnowski, athletic counselor was the one who made Camp's goals.

### TURNS IN A PERFECT SCORE

SUNDAY (July 18)--Cabin 6, which took 1st place in Camp's first track meet two weeks ago, and then captured third in last week's track meet, today turned in their best performance, as they scored 20 points, the top possible score, in today's water meet.

Three boys accounted for all of Cabin 6's points: Herb Beller had 8, Larry Silton tallied 7 and Ted Pasternack gained 5 points.

### LEHMAN'S 10 POINTS TOP SWIMMEET SCORE

SUNDAY (July 18)--Ken Lehman, who has shown promise of becoming an extraordinary swimmer as he grows older, today led Cabin 4 to third place in the water meet, as Ken himself managed to turn in a perfect score of 10 points: first place in both events.

Ken has made fine showings in track meets, also, scoring all of Cabin 4's points in the first and 8 out of 10 in last week's meet.
