

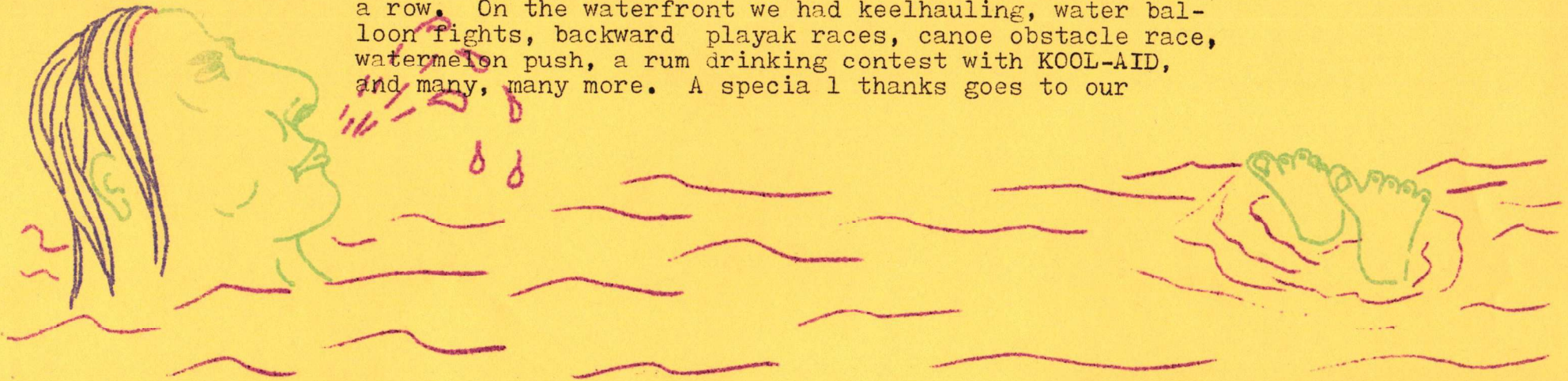
CLASSES 1974

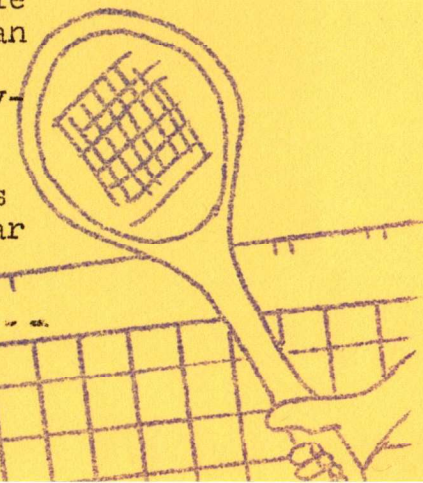
In the first and second hour classes, we tried to have some tournaments. Some of those winners were Glenn Spear, Mike Denenberg and Bob DuBoe.

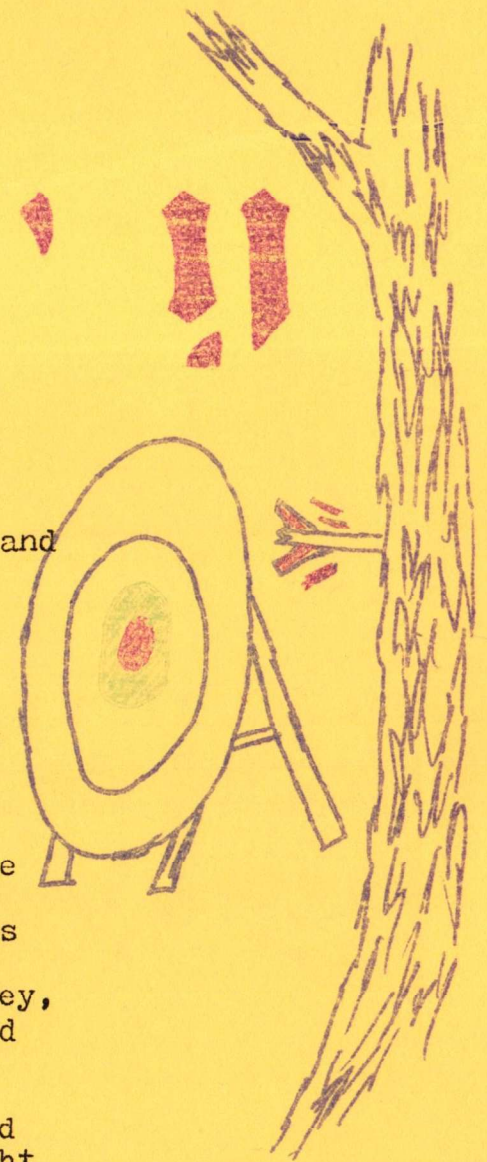
Archery
