

There aren't any camps in this country that could ever equal or surpass the quality of our waterfront in personnel, equipment, or programs. Our swimming and skiing instructors invested a tremendous amount of time and energy in keeping the waterfront fun for the campers, but most of all, "safe." All boys in cabins 1 - 15 attended swim classes Monday through Saturday, one period per day. All swim classes were designed to follow the standards established by the American Red Cross. After the boys were given their swim check for free periods, they spent 4 - 5 class periods in a course called "Basic Water Safety." "The objective of the course was to provide the individual, regardless of his lack of swimming ability, with the knowledge and skills designed to safely handle aquatic emergencies." This course was followed by individual evaluations of each boy's swimming ability. On the basis of these evaluations each camper was placed within one of the following classes: Beginner, Advanced Beginner, Intermediate, Swimmer, or Junior Life Saving (Basic Rescue and Water Safety).

This year we also had more time out on ski trips than we have had in quite awhile, and they were enjoyed by all who went on them.


The trips went out to Pine Lake,


