There were also other players who improved through the course of the basketball class. They were: Dan Shaffer, Ross Lipman, Mike Denenberg, and Ricky Cohen.



For a first-time class at camp, it went very well, and I hope all the campers enjoyed it.


FLOOR HOCKEY

Horseback riding was new and different this year. This is our second year at the Black Saddle Stables with some old and many new and different horses. Interest was really up and attendance was at an all-time high.



I want to commend Robert Schneider on his efforts in capturing the hog nose snake, and I would like to thank all of the salamanders for being where they were at the times we were


looking for them.
