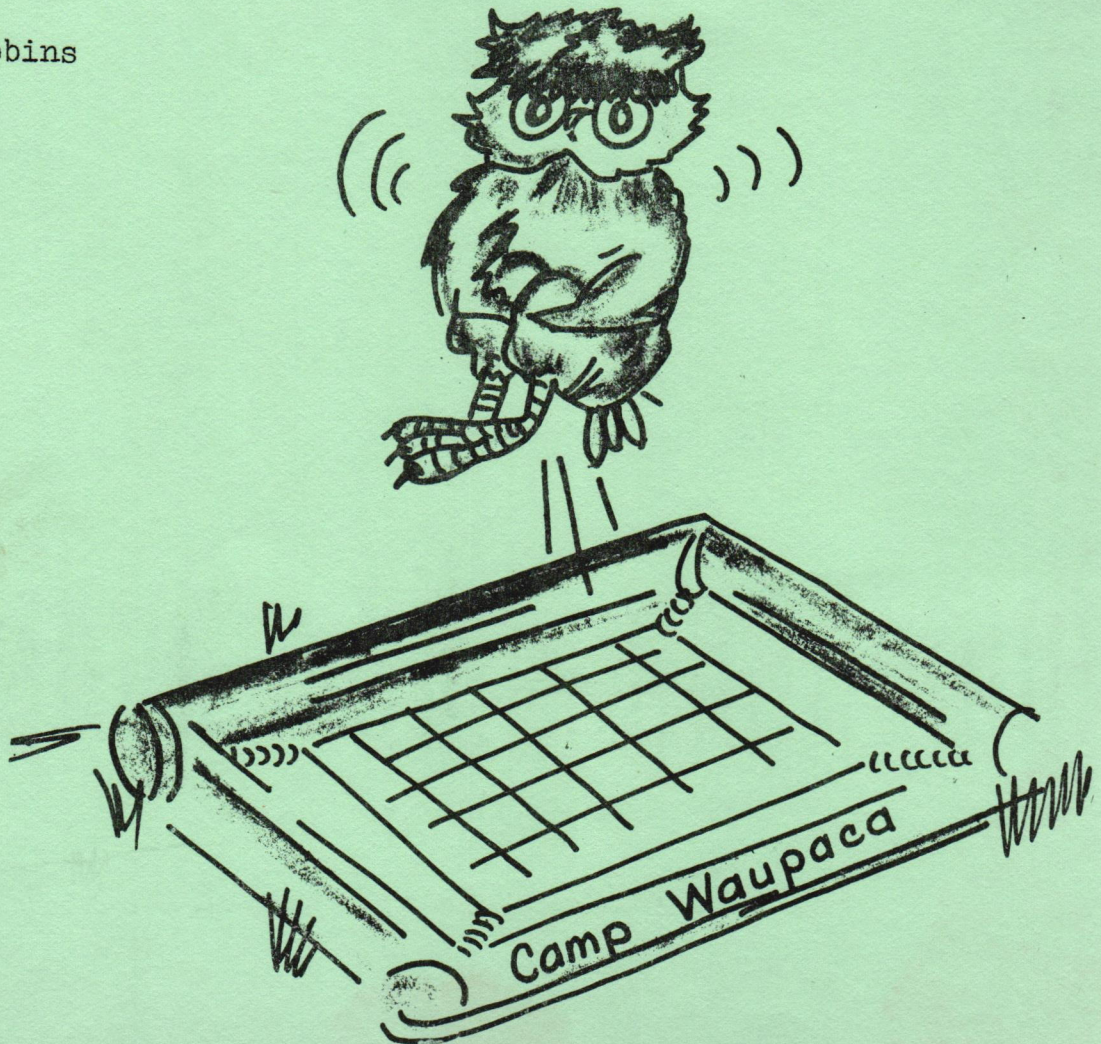

CABINS

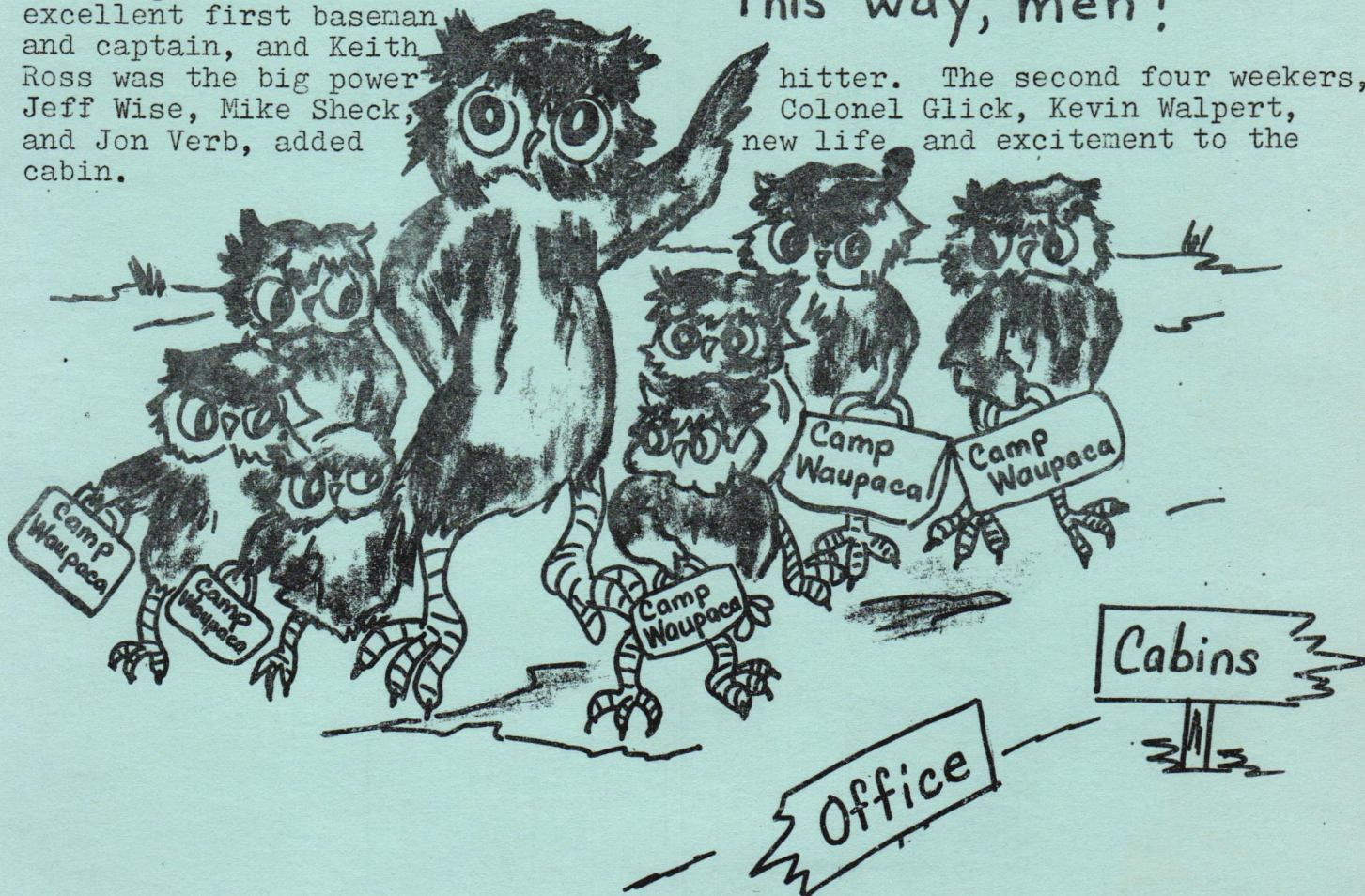
We are the kids that come from cabin one,

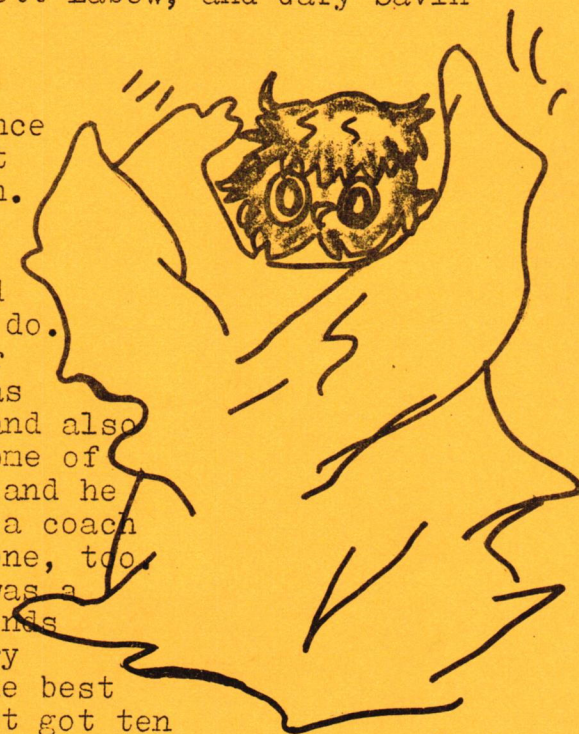


