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
# Letter From The Editor


# Memo From Manny

#### WAUPACA WAGES WAR ON POUNDS

This year the diet table was out and counting calories was in. All campers and staff who wanted to lose some weight joined the WAUPACA WAR ON POUNDS and became a member of the Porkers or the Oinkers. Campers were instructed in the number of calories they should have daily in order to lose one pound a week, while most of the staff tried to lose two pounds a week. The number of calories for all foods eaten at camp (including canteen) were posted. All those who lost 1 - 2 pounds per week were awarded certificates for "Counting Calories Sensibly."

For the first 4 weeks the Oinkers won the war by 99% to 85% for the Porkers. A total of 122 pounds was lost the first four weeks.

For the second four weeks the Porkers won by 50% to 37%. A total of 201.5 pounds for the season!

We applaud all those - 30 campers and 13 staff - who participated in the war, especially Keith Ross who demonstrated - week after week - that it is possible to "lose weight with intelligence." Also, Mike Euer who will surprise everyone in East Prairie, Missouri with his new physique.

# Canteen


