

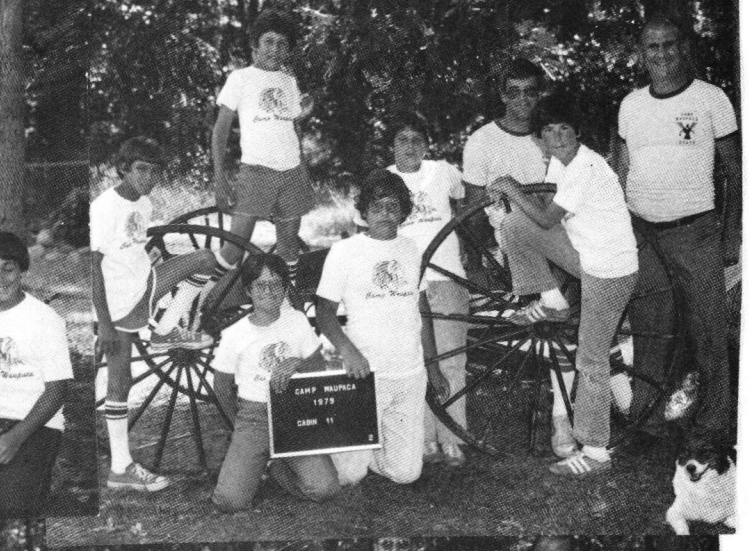

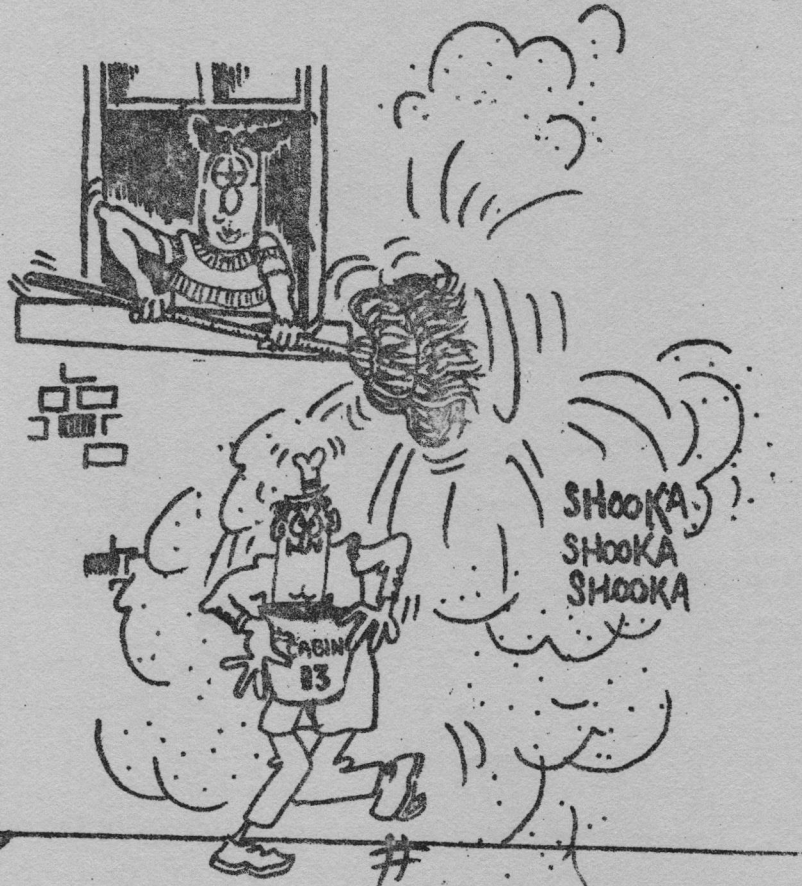




CABINS
