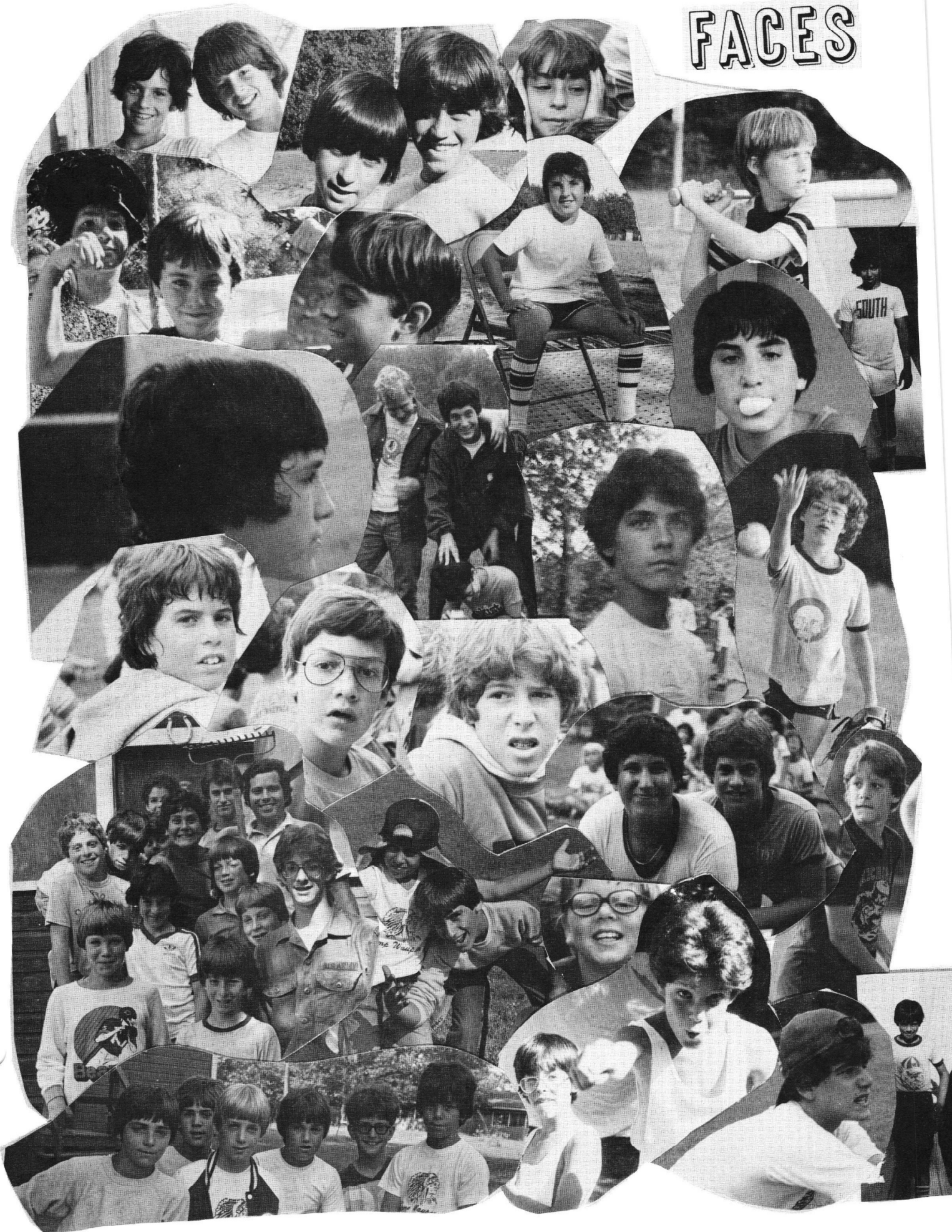


FACES



ARCHERY

It seems the Archery Department hit the bullseye this year for we had more new shooters excelling this year than ever before. From the first class we sought to develop good form and to encourage new archers to build good habits. Older archers will remember our squawky instructions to put the "arrow on the other side of the bow," & "don't move your hand after you shoot." Older archers many times had to re-learn the basics before improving their shooting.

A variety of targets, tournaments and incentives were brought into play this year on the range. Occasionally a dollar bill would appear on the bullseye, or a balloon, cup or other picture.

Many records were set this year. Among them Jackie Sirajullah started things off with 20 bullseyes or better in one class period three times! Greg Richman hit 50 bullseyes in an afternoon and Joel Feinstein hit 15 bullseyes in one class (with 12 other campers, so his shooting time was drastically cut). Rough counts of bullseyes first four are Steve Reitmeister 125, Jackie Sirajullah 80, Cole Leavitt 72, Joel Feinstein with 56, and Jimmy Feinstein 51.

Some of the best improved archers would include Josh Myers, Harley Naroff, Tony Davis, Mark Leb, Scott Siegal, Elizabeth Euer, and Jay Goldstein.

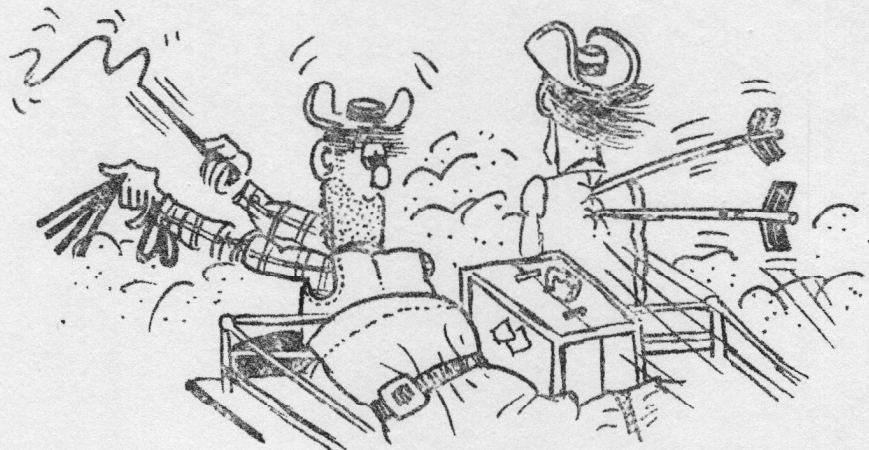
A team was selected for the meet at Camp Micquano and an unbelievable match occurred. With five archers from each team firing 25 arrows each (10 practice) the Junior team TIED 218 arrows each. Boys stand 100 feet from the target (usually a ring of traffic cones) and angling their bows slightly, try to land the arrows in the circle. It is a great test of skill and is a lot of fun, too.

The second four weeks saw a new group of archers who were as eager as the first batch to improve their shooting. Most improved from the second four would include Matt Belden, Ricky Horwitz, Jeremy and Jason Perlow, Bobby Gruen, Dave Melam, James Atlas, Ted Levine, and Josh Greenstein.

A special jug shoot saw Rick Fradin connecting 6 times with the "A & W Jug". Bob Moskiewicz 5, and Craig Friedman 4 times.

The Archery Ladder was constructed from class averages and held during the class and third week free times. Persons could only challenge three people above themselves and these challenges had to be accepted. A lower person on the ladder winning the match switched places with the upper, and a successful defence kept the higher position in tact. The last day of challenges saw Jeff Shapiro, Joel Feinstein, and Steve Prebish tooth and nail for the coveted number one spot and the award of a 1980 Burgundy Cadillac Seville. Steve Reitmeister lost his first place to Jeff Shapiro in a classic sudden death overtime of four arrows. Feinstein lost to Shapiro when a Bullseye arrow popped out of the target. It wasn't over, tho as Joel beat Reitmeister by 2 point and gained another chance to beat the number one spot but...time ran out. Tough luck, Joel, maybe next year. 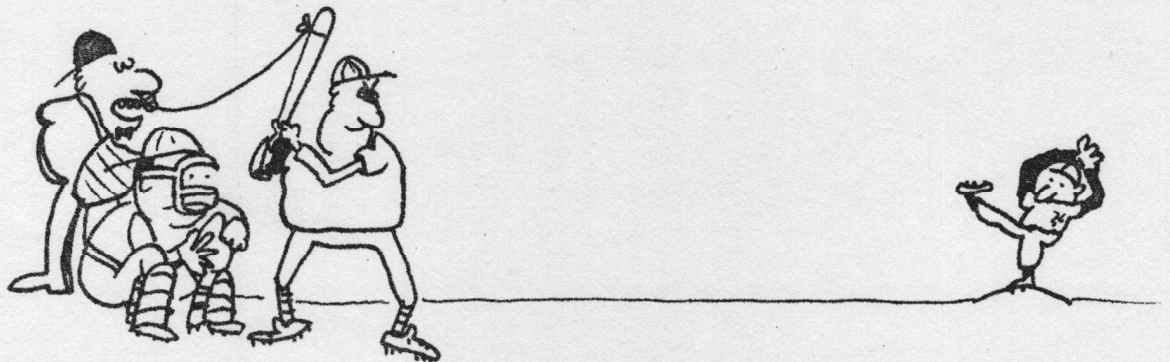
BASEBALL

This year the emphasis during basketball class was on skill development. Each class period began with a simple lay-up drill. After the initial warm up, more difficult drills were executed.

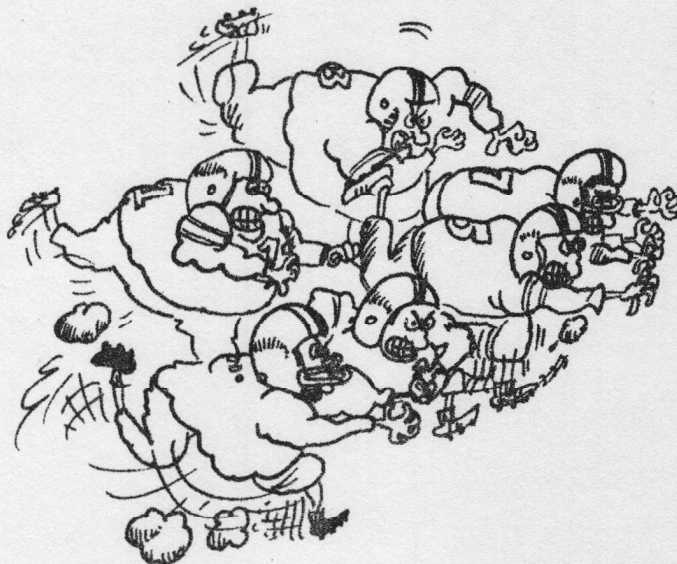
Five man weave...three man weave...double line passing...confusion...dribble tag...three on one...suicides, (Run Fuhrman, run.)...three on one...three on two...and on.

CRAFTS

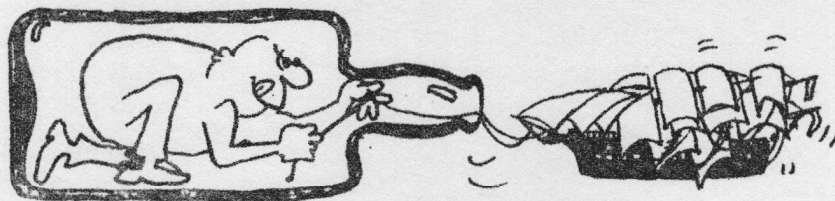

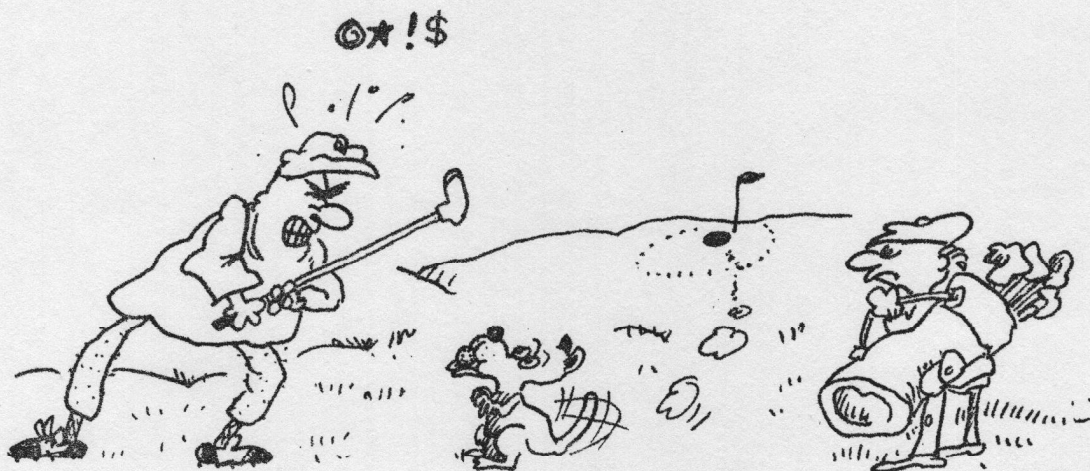
The Annual longest drive contest was held with Bob Gross, Mike Schechtman, Jeff Shapiro, and Judd Feldman fairing very well.

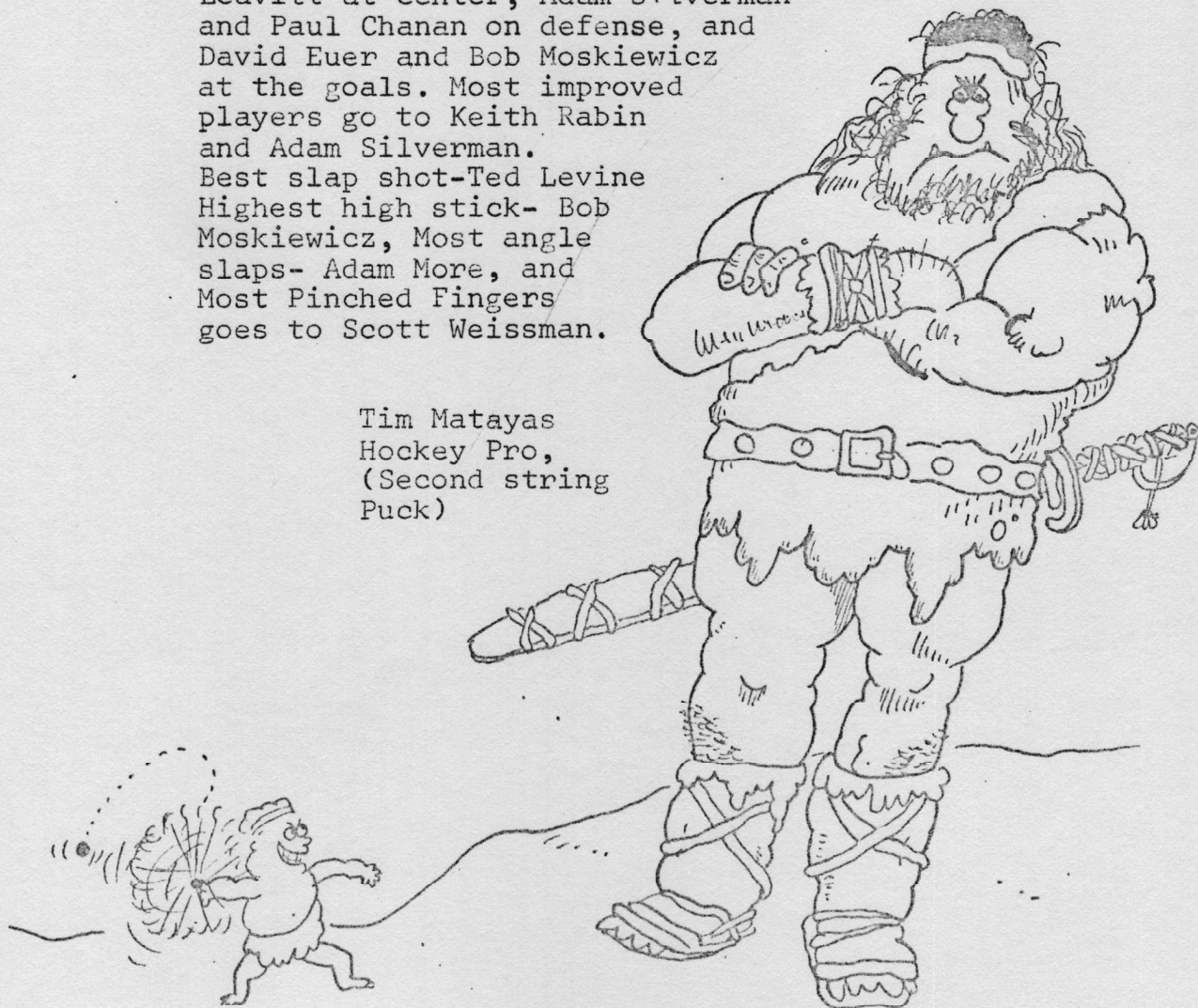

The first four weeks saw a very enthusiastic number of nature buffs. Even though there were not too many boys enrolled, the ones who were had fun.

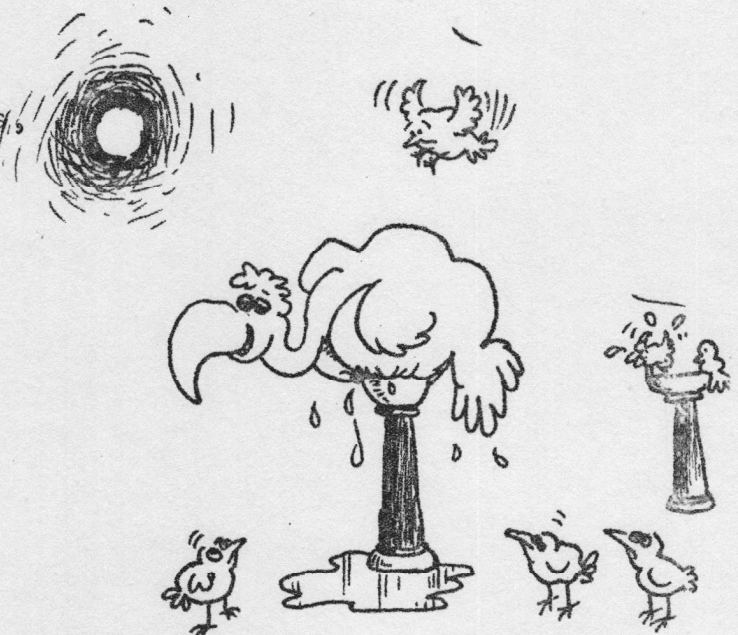

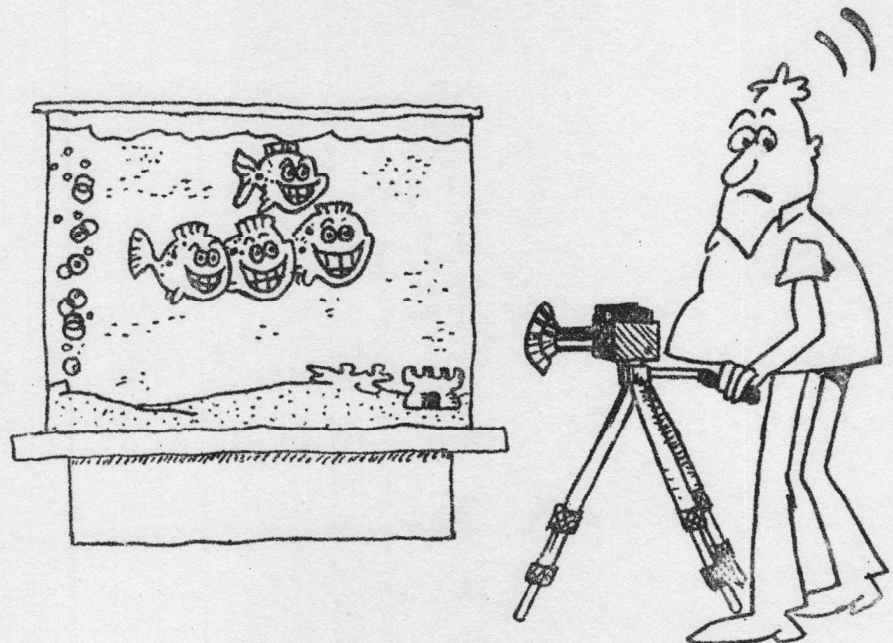
Our program consists mainly of familiarizing all campers with the fundamentals of picture taking, film developing, printing, enlarging and darkroom techniques for quality improvement.
