

Archery

Perfection in archery, as in all things, takes a great deal of practice and an enormous amount of patience. This year was no exception. We encouraged boys to shoot "from the present" in order to correct their mistakes of the past. "How can you get one arrow in the hay and the next in the bullseye?" was a frequently asked question. As instructors, that is where our job began.

Safety is always paramount on the archery range and we encourage the boys to exercise good range etiquette and form. Only three shooters were allowed on the "line" at a time, and the shooting was conducted in a safe and orderly fashion. Sometimes we would have to remind campers five and six times that "the arrow goes on the same side as the hand that holds it!"



Archery-golf featured styrofoam targets to test accuracy at great distances; balloons, paper plates, cups, and other such diverse items as "special pictures" also found their way onto targets. Other attractions at the range this year included feet-shooting and the ever popular dollar shoot. 

Basketball




