Kenny Lapins turned out a funny characterization of the old sailor, Lorenze Frizzlebean and Alan Hochman and Loren Roseman alternated as the evil Count de Nickels. Joel Feinstein played an elegant Clementina. John Riff played the G-man, Dadzanger Duddlerumper. The class also worked on other improvisations.



We began the long process of rehearsing the Odd Couple for the third year in a row. I thought this year we had the best cast ever. The second four weeks saw a large increase in the drama classes. Two more classes had to be added to meet the enrollment of 60. First hour classes worked on improvisations of camp life. David Pine played Eugene Poindexter and Adam Leninson played the sloppy camper, Philbert Crudde. Josh Myers played Manny and David Euer played his father, Mike. Then we had our own portrayels of the CITs: Berkey played by Adam More, Wristman was Adam Bland and Jim Feinstein as Pubish. Gary Korrub has the honor of playing Mike Hollohead. Also some excellent work was done in Certs (Its a breath mint -- No, its a laxative.) In this work Adam Bland and Rich Freidman performed& did some excellant commercial improvisations.

The other first hour class prepared an Indian ceremonial. The idea was to create a feeling that Indians had arrived from the past and planned to show tha people of the present how they lived and worshipped. The boys thought imaginatively about the ways and customs of the Indians and came up with several demonstrations that are worthy of merit. Jeff Zeinfeld thought of the side of the Indians while Steve Ellis thought of the peaceful Indians. Mike Hochman presented the anger and frustrations the Indians must have felt about their land being taken away, and Doug Shabelman presented the mystical fascination of Indian magic. Adam Shwartz worked with the ceremony of lighting a sacred fire. Scott Silverman worked on the epic dance of The Eagle. Greg Berke and Al Hochman helped us occasionally.

The second hour worked on spot improvisations during the times we met. Some days were spent on emergency improvisations like being trapped in an elevator, lifeboat, airplane, or bathroom without a way out. The class made some perceptive observations about what to do and in terms of self sacrifices for the good of the group. Some commercials were also done. Who can forget Matt Beldon & Scott Rubin doing an airline commercial "We're American Airlines, doing what we do the worst!" or Jeremy Platt & Scott Ring doing a commercial for the lenghty White Sox baseball season from August all the way through September! The last few days of class we set up a soap opera with Jim Feinstein as Joe Schmo and Josh Ring as Sara Schmo. Matt Brown was their son, Junior Schmo. Two quack doctors Dr. Harry and Dr. Jones, played by Judd Rosenberg and Larry Shneider respectively, wanted to saw off Junior's leg. Josh Greenstein eventually played the defense attorney for Mr. Big, played by Robert Master and Snake Eyes his henchman played by Adam More. Bobby Pine played the FBI agent and Jeremy Platt was the judge who sentenced them to jail for trying to kidnap Junior Jones. A good time and creative dialogue helped the class do well. The last class was spent in picture improvs - we cut pictures from the magazines and asked the boys to make up situations concerning the people in the photos. It was very funny!

The other second hour class was the Movie Production class. They brainstormed, wrote, created characters and eventually filmed their epic "Gold Tuchas" spoofing the James Bond thriller "Goldfinger". 

## Nature




We will not soon forget the "Bronco Brandon Wild West Show" - and the immortal words of Brandon Wolf: "I wanna get off!"
