

RIDING

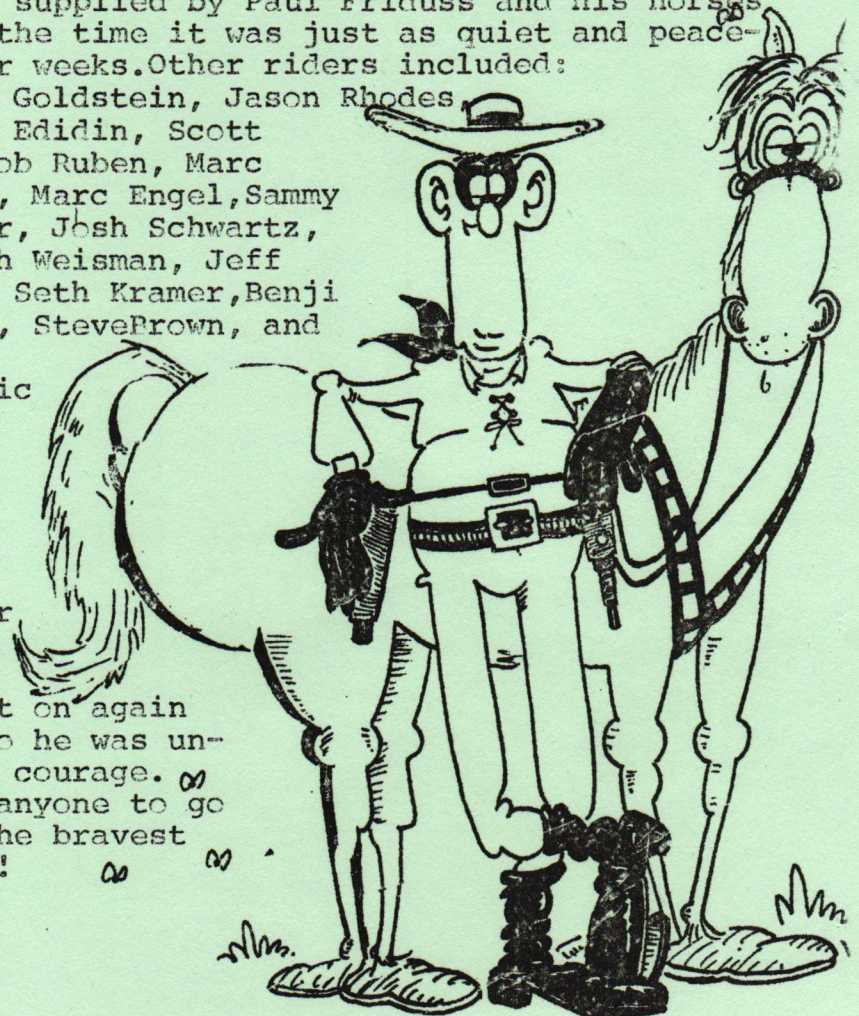

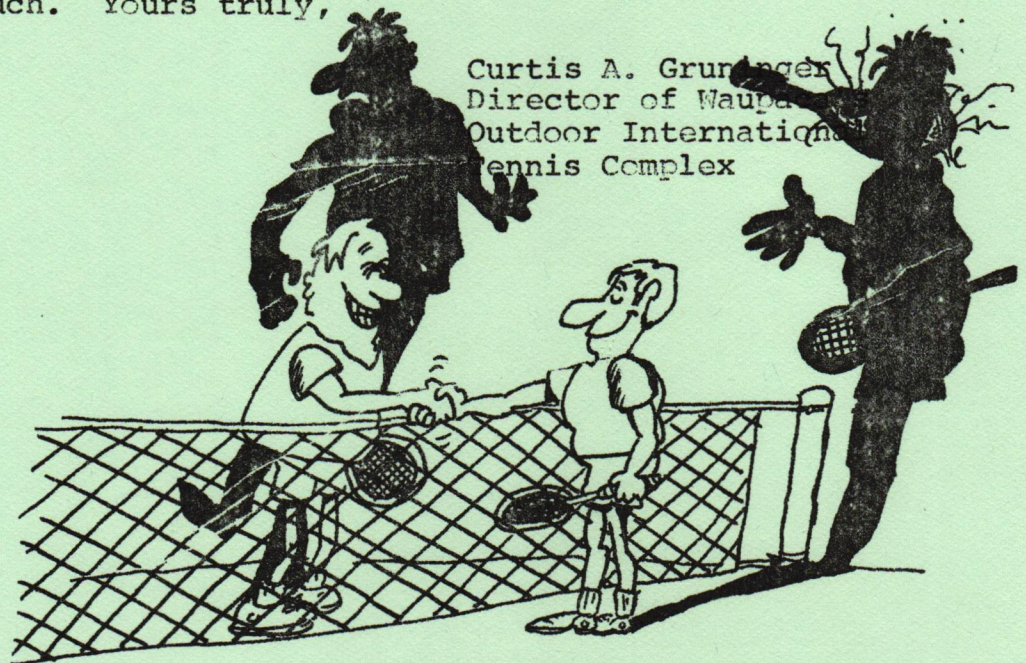
TENNIS

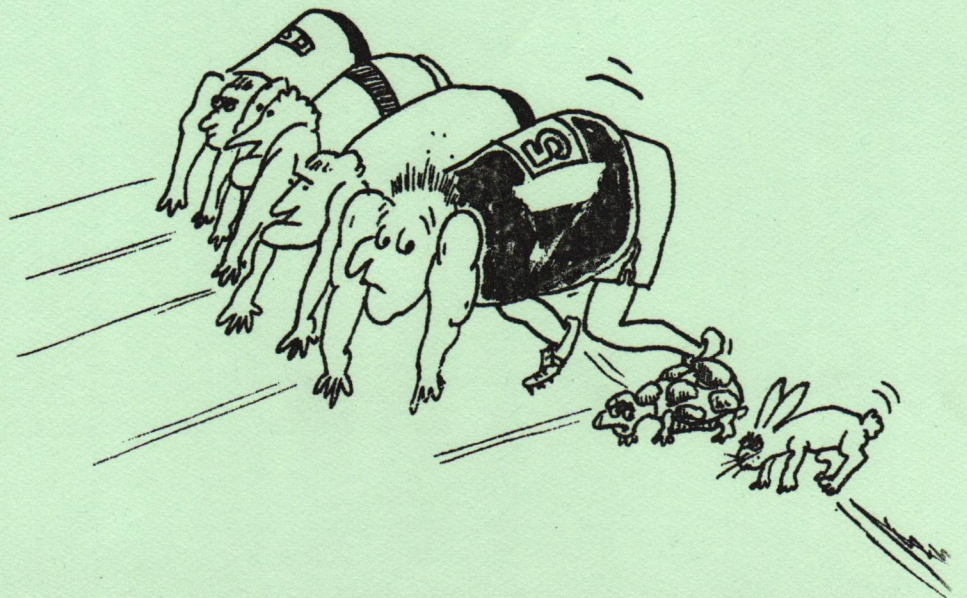

The third class skiers must be able to ski 20 seconds and glide to a stop. The following boys earned that award:

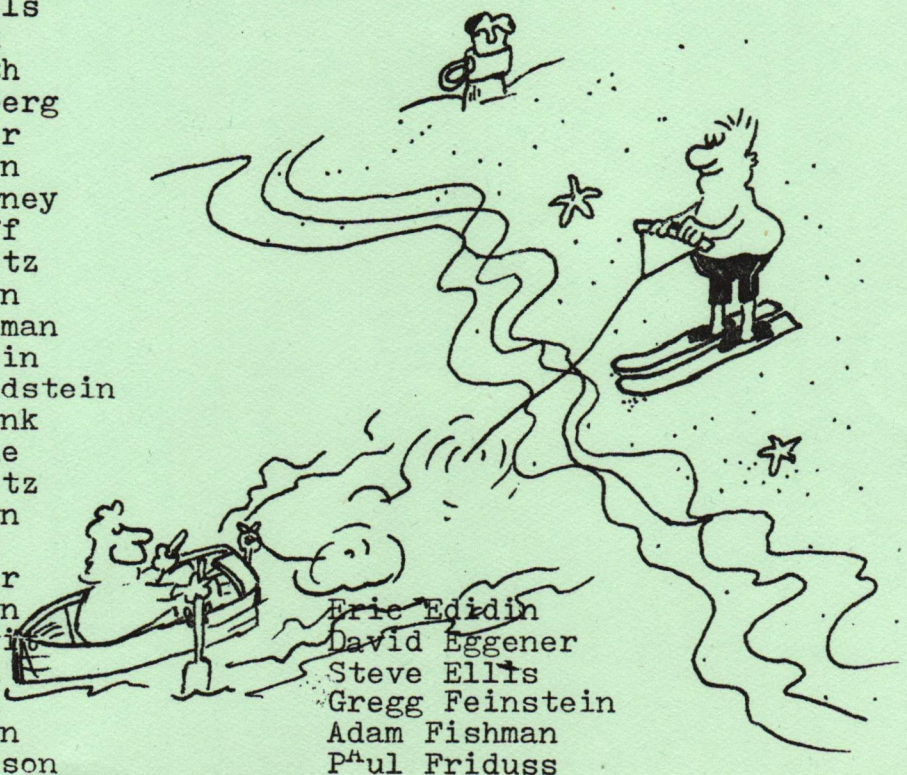
