


Memo From Manny


wrinkle your noses.


Good sports of the year goes to Andrew Costello who did what he was told even tho he wasn't thrilled about the whole thing.

Matt Brown, Jon Torshen, Gregg Feinstein, and Corey


Fisher. Outstanding defensive players included Matt


All our budding craftsmen should be able to carry their acquired skills back home and at school. It was a great

Computers

The summer of 1983 marked the first year of Camp Waupaca's new and exciting computer programming class. Equipped with seven Apple computers, a printer, and our newly remodeled, fully air-conditioned computer room, we are excited about how successful our program has been after only one summer.

One of the most popular activities at camp, the computers were always busy. Over 60% of our campers were enrolled in the program. Despite the large numbers of campers, our classes were held to 12 or less and practice sessions were held to allow campers to work one-to-one

with our new Apple IIe computers.

During the first four weeks, our beginner classes learned how to operate the computer and run games and programs. These boys learned how to write programs to print on the screen, and later learned how to write programs in low resolution color graphics. Learning high resolution graphics allowed the campers to create even more magic on the computers. Finally using our Edu-Paint program, the campers discovered a new dimension in color graphics. Most of the boys wrote a letter home on the computer/printer and all campers must agree that they took home a lot of computer skills after just one short summer.

Our advanced class worked on some very interesting topics during the first four weeks. The boys learned about making shape tables and writing programs to animate high resolution shapes and make them move on the screen. The boys actually wrote a machine language program to create musical sounds, and suddenly the mysteries of advanced computer programming seemed easy to master for the boys in the advanced class.

During the second four weeks our instruction featured special class projects such as:


1. The high resolution sketching program

4. A Pair of Dice

5. Blackjack

The advanced 8-weekers discovered Peeks and pokes, and spent several class periods learning how to make sequential text files. The intermediate boys perfected their skills, worked on class projects, and demonstrated that in a few short weeks, they had mastered the fundamentals of micro computer programming.



The second four week programmers were placed in separate classes. They covered much of the same material as the boys who had been in camp for the first four.

In all, we would have to say that the program was a great success and the outlook for the future is exciting indeed. Next year we plan to have some new equipment, a great deal of new and fun projects to work on, and for the advanced classes we will have some data processing work and instruction in other programming languages.

Dramatics




Early classes focused on the fundamentals including the grip, stance, ball position, and swing mechanics. Later classes worked on improving technique and play strategy.

In Nature class this year we had many and varying activities such as hiking, fishing, identification of animals and animals, and the work and play of the animal in the natura center.



Swimming


