

Mini Bikes







Skiing

The rude awakening of Lake Stratton fish marks the opening of the water skiing season at Camp Waupaca. The non-stop fun of Camp Waupaca has made days melt with days, week with week. The end is here, but yet somehow it feels as if camp is just starting. The ski season flew as quickly and soared as high as spray from the ski of an expert. The first four weeks found two additions to Camp Waupaca's ski equipment: the "tube," and a pair of skis designed for trick skiing. The "tube" is an inner tube designed to be towed behind a water ski boat. Many of this year's skiers can attest to the fun and thrills that riding on the tube brought, but without question, Harold Pine (who assisted in ski instruction) was the top tuber this summer. The trick skis were as gladly received as the tube was fun; by using the skis to learn basic tricks, skiers achieved the level of expert camp skier. For the first time, many of this summer's skiers felt the sensation of "sliding" over the water on skis without rudders!

Last year's beginning and intermediate slamom skiers showed much progress during this season. Some have mastered the difficult flying dock start, and all have learned the mechanics of the "slamom cut," and how to send up a wall of

spray.

The second four weeks proved Camp Waupaca's busiest: an average day had seven classes; an average class had 17 students. That translates to 119 water skiers per day. The second four weeks also marked the return of last year's staff members Rick Theiler and Cliff Broeniman. What was perhaps the most memorable highlight this year was Brian McCarrall finally succeeding at slalom skiing. Brian has been here for three years, and has made the big step to one ski. Brian picked the perfect day to slalom—it was Parents' Day.



The season's hard work award goes to Gary Alterson and Steve Goldberg. Gary's determination, despite countless falls, was unshakable in his quest to do a front to back turn on trick skis. It was the only obstacle remaining in his being certified an expert skier, and unfortunately it still remains after his hard and extensive practice. Steve came to camp this year with one thing in mind: he wanted to slalom. He mastered the kick off, but could not maintain his balance long enough to fulfill the requirement. The hard work of these two guys show us the kind of devotion you must have if you want to excel.

The Camp Waupaca Barefoot Club had diminished numbers this season with only two members: Steve Wanty and Scott Silverman. Both of our footers improved over last year, and Scott was nearly flawless on his feet, and in fact on his foot: he water skied on just one foot. On two feet, he set a new camp endurance record: three and one-third consecutive laps around the lake!

The skiers and ski staff both have been enjoying the new, larger engine that was bought during the second four week session. With 90 horsepower, the sky is the

limit for Camp Waupaca skiers!

The biggest thrill of any skier is, and always will be watching a beginning skier get up out of the water, and skiing for the first time. The excitement and fulfilled anticipation can be seen on the faces of everyone within eyesight of the newest Camp Waupaca skier. Hard work always pays off with results, and as can be seen by the next several pages, Camp Waupaca skiers are certainly no exception.

At Camp Waupaca, campers can earn American Water Ski Association certification of their water skiing skills and abilities. All performance tests must be witnessed by one of the camp's water skiing instructors, and no more than three attempts at a test item can be made in one day. Each level of achievement has specific requirements of the waterskier.

Third class camp skiers must answer correctly questions concerning the Water Skiers' Safety Code. They must also demonstrate water skier's signals to a boat driver, as well as show an ability to adjust binders, and be able to put on water skis in waist deep water. All third class skiers are required to make an unassisted deep or shallow water start on two skis, cross both wakes, and return to the center of the wake without falling. To complete their test, the third class skier must ride for at least one minute without falling, then release the handle and coast unassisted to a stop without losing their balance.

After completing the requirements to be rated a third class camp skier, a camper is eligible to take the second class test. This test requires you put on water skis in deep water, and make an unassisted deep water start, as well as make a seated start from a dock or float, and start immediately after coming to a stop in deep water. A second class skier must be able to ski at "stalling" speed (just fast enough to keep control). They must also be able to lift one ski clear of the water for at least two seconds, and be able to place the handle between their legs and ride with their hands free.

For a camper to increase his rating to first class camp skier, he must start out on two skis, then take one off, and remain skiing for at least twenty seconds. On one ski, the camper is also required to ride across both wakes and return in good control, then, after releasing the handle, coast to a stop without falling. It's also required that the skier, on two skis, jump off of the wake, clearing both skis of the water, and with the boat in a tight turn, be able to swing to the outside ("snap the whip"), and maintain good skiing control.

For a camper to increase his rating from first class to expert camp skier, he must be able to make both a deep water and dock start, and make six continuous turn on that one ski, travelling no slower than 25 miles per hour! To be rated "expert," a camper must also be able to perform tricks, such as skiing backwards, a two ski "side slide," and front to back turns.

Simply being pulled around by a boat does not guarantee any skier advancement. Advancement comes only after good instruction, and hour after hour of practice. It is only when these two ingredients are combined, that an expert skier is made.
