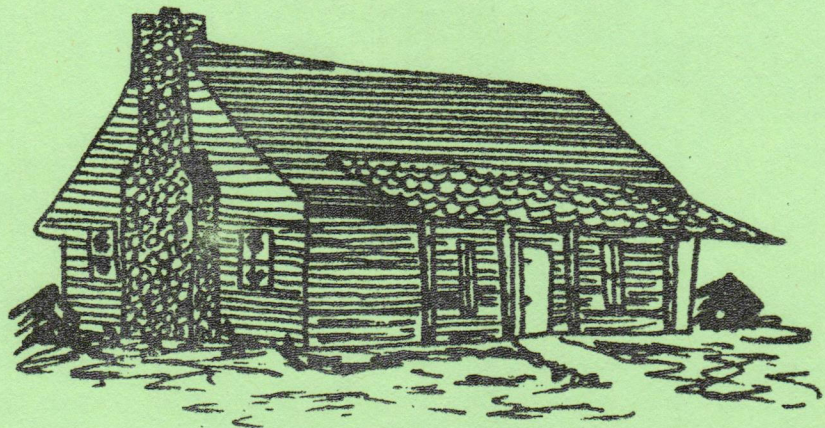


# Cabins
